SCRIPTURE REFLECTION- FATHER JOHN MARIA

Today's readings (Cycle B) for the 5th Sunday of Lent are about turning points: in God's plan of salvation history; in the events of the life of Jesus, and in our own lives.

In the first reading, the Lord is signaling through the prophet Jeremiah a huge turning point – a new covenant. This occurred around 600 BC, at perhaps the lowest point for God's old covenant people. In their misery, the Lord was revealing hope for blessings beyond their imagination.

God had called a people to covenant (a sacred family bond) with Him. This happened first with Adam, then with Noah, and later with Abraham. This would expand with Moses and later with King David. Into this development, Jeremiah prophesied a new covenant, written on the heart. There were many signs that this would be offered not only to the eldest brother Israel, but to all of God's family.

In the Gospel, some Greeks asked to see Jesus. This signified a major turning point, when the Lord would draw ALL to Himself.

As we journey forward in Lent, we should pause to reflect upon His call to YOUR heart. We will soon recall how He gave His flesh and blood on the cross. We will soon remember that He offered His Body and Blood at the Lord's Supper – His new and eternal covenant.

He is calling YOU to give your life to Him.

Jesus is Truly Present: Body, Blood, Soul & Divinity. Why do we believe this? What does it mean to say the Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith? Why do we say He is the Lamb of God? What did Jesus teach about the "Bread of Life"?

The evenings begin at 6:30pm, REC Social Hall with a video from FORMED, followed by discussion questions and Q&A. Light drinks will be available, in keeping with these Lenten Fridays. Don't just give up chocolate for Lent, grow stronger in your Catholic faith. Join us Friday, March 22 at 6:30pm!



REFLECTION... by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Thinking of your early school days, you likely remember the name of "that kid." He or she was the one who, by dint of personality and intelligence you just know, had caught the eye of the teacher. Of course, unknown to us at the time, the teacher had to make the professional effort not to categorize that one student as a "pet."

Later on in life, you saw the same dynamic in action when a certain co-worker was favored by the boss. In times past the boss might make his favoritism obvious. Not so today, where an HR office would pounce on the perpetrator quickly. Even to the point of dismissal.

On a much higher plain of observation, we could easily imagine Our Lord being the envy of His peers for what He said and did. Careful as He was to preclude praise let alone adulation of any kind, the people He ministered to knew instinctively that He had favor with Yahweh. Their wish to honor Him was a constant problem for Jesus, requiring Him to take action. At one point He even fled the crowd lest they make Him a king.

Jesus modeled the virtue of humility, but at the same time He knew God the Father in a way we never will. His respect for the Father was so obvious that the later unknown writer of the Letter to the Hebrews that we hear in today's Mass could write that "He was heard because of His reverence when He prayed.

Reverence. There is a word. A state of being. A quality worth developing in our lives. It is a habit of being that begins with God and applies to the things of God but reaches down to our relations with our neighbor. Most often we in our present day can know reverence as the missing element in our common culture as we daily witness the opposite of it.

Something is terribly wrong about the way we freely murder our fellow man in the streets of our cities, and on the battlefields of our wars.

Add this the coldness with which our society wants to erase God from being a deciding factor in all we say and do. We've made other gods, often enough. Gods of power, wealth and fame.

As the waning days of Lent 2024 are upon us, may I suggest a project that will take us all way past Easter? It's to develop our reverence for God and our neighbor.

God love you and lead you to betterment and a better Lent.

Lenten Reconciliation Service – Sunday, March 24 at 3pm

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." This famous passage from John 3:16 illustrates the Lord's mission to save us, and share His grace, love and mercy!

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is an essential channel of His grace. In this season of Lent, we recall His willingness to die for each of us. We must also acknowledge the reality of sin, and our need for His mercy.

Many object and say, "Why do I need to go to another human being? Whose idea was that?"

The answer is ... Jesus. After His resurrection from the dead (John 20:21-23), Jesus breathed His Holy Spirit upon the Apostles (the first priests of the new covenant) and gave them the power to forgive sins – an amazing gift! It is humbling to speak our sins to another, but He wants us to hear God's mercy spoken. We can leave the sacrament without any doubt that we have "owned up," and we can be sure that He has lifted the burden.

Each and every confession is confidential, protected by the seal of the sacrament. You may go face to face or confess anonymously behind the screen, whichever you prefer. You can be sure that there is no judgment. Priests have devoted their lives to bringing souls to Christ!

Please make time to prepare well and come back to His mercy, no matter how long it has been. If you are unsure of the steps, don't worry. The priest will walk you through it. The most important step is to examine your conscience, so that you may know the sins you must confess.

On the reverse side, you will find an "examination of conscience" to help you prepare well for the sacrament. The purpose of this is not to cause discouragement, anxiety or shame, but to stimulate repentance and desire to be reconciled with the God ... who so loved the world that he gave His only Son!

Be not afraid! Jesus, we trust in you!

How to Go to Confession:

- 1. Begin with the Sign of the Cross.
- 2. Tell the priest how long it has been since your last confession.

YOU: Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. My last confession was _____ ago.

3. Confess your sins simply and peacefully.

When you finish, you may say: "I am sorry for these and all of my sins."

- The priest will speak to you and possibly offer some advice or encouragement. He will then give you a penance to fulfill after your confession. He will ask you to pray an Act of Contrition.
- 5. You will then pray the Act of Contrition: (You may use your own words.)

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended You. And I detest all my sins because of Your just punishments, but most of all because they offend You, my God, who are all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Your grace, to sin no <u>more</u> and to avoid the near occasions of sin. Amen.

- 6. The priest will then forgive your sins with the prayer of absolution.
- 7. After the absolution, you will join Father in giving thanks and praise to God....
 - PRIEST: Give thanks to the Lord for He is good.

YOU: His mercy endures forever.

PRIEST: The Lord has freed you from your sins. Go in peace.

YOU: Thanks be to God!

- [†] Have I blasphemed God, the Church, the saints or sacred places or things?

3. Remember to keep holy the Lord's Day.

- [†] Have I skipped Mass on a Sunday or Holy Day without serious reason?
- Do I keep Sunday as a day of prayer and rest? Or do I treat Sunday as any other day?
- [†] Have I deliberately come late or left early from Mass without a good reason?

4. Honor your father and your mother.

- [†] Do I honor and respect my parents? Have I deliberately hurt my parents?
- [†] Do I treat my children with love and respect?
- Thave I neglected family duties?
- [†] Do I show respect for my lawful superiors?

5. You shall not kill.

- 🕆 Have I deliberately harmed anyone?
- [†] Have I had an abortion or encouraged an abortion? Have I attempted suicide or seriously considered it?
- [†] Have I abused drugs or alcohol?
- [†] Have I led anyone to sin through bad example or through direct encouragement?

6. You shall not commit adultery.

For the married

- [†] Am I faithful to my spouse in thought and action? Have I used artificial contraception, or been sterilized?
- [†] Was I married outside the Church without proper permission of the Bishop?

For the unmarried

T Have I engaged in sexual activity with anyone of either sex?

For all

- [†] Have I deliberately viewed pornographic magazines, <u>videos</u> or websites?
- † Have I masturbated?
- [†] Have I used impure language or told impure jokes? Do I dress immodestly or lead others into temptation?

7. You shall not steal.

- T Have I stolen or accepted stolen goods?
- [†] Have I deliberately destroyed the property of others? Have I cheated anyone of what I owe?
- [†] Do I gamble excessively?
- [†] Do I share what I have with the poor and the Church according to my means?

8. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

- T Have I lied? Have I sworn falsely?
- T Have I plagiarized or been academically dishonest?
- [†] Have I gossiped? Have I revealed secrets or confidential information without good reason?
- [†] Have I ruined the good name of others by spreading lies or needlessly revealing their faults and sins?

9. You shall not desire your neighbor's wife.

- [†] Have I deliberately and consciously permitted sexual thoughts about anyone besides my spouse?
- [†] Do I guard my imagination and senses?
- [†] Have I watched shows, pictures or movies that contain impure scenes with the deliberate intention of being aroused?

10. You shall not desire your neighbor's goods.

Am I envious of the possessions, abilities, talents, beauty, or success of others?

You shall love your neighbor <u>as</u> yourself.

- [†] Do I love my neighbor? Is there anyone whom I refuse to love? Have I wished harm on anyone?
- Do I forgive from my heart those who have hurt me? Do I harbor hatred or grudges? Do I pray for my enemies?
- There I ridiculed or humiliated others?
- [†] Do I seek to help others in need?
- [†] Do I love myself as God loves me? Do I care for my physical, emotional, and spiritual health?
- Do I forgive myself for my sins after bringing them to God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation?

Precepts of the Church

- [†] We are obligated to keep holy the Lord's Day by attending Mass each Sunday and Holy Day of Obligation. Have I deliberately missed Mass without a serious reason?
- Have I gone to confession at least once a year when I have serious sins to confess?
- If eligible, do I receive Holy Communion, at least once during Easter time?
- [†] Do I abstain from meat on Fridays in Lent (14+) and fast on one full meal on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (ages 18-59)? Do I fast for one hour before Holy Communion (water and medicine allowed)?
- [†] Do I contribute to support the material needs of the Church?
